Chairwoman of St. Louis County Council and Councilwoman of the 5th district, Lisa Clancy received an overall High Impact level. That means that on several issues she was the champion of a cause. She held office hours/town halls, organized movements and community events to advocate for these issues, and worked with other levels of government, businesses, and social programs to advance these issues. However, she is not quite a champion for all these issues yet. This report shows the breakdown of the policies she was a real champion for, as well as those areas in which she could do better.

Recommendations for Improvement:

- Speak with and listen to Community Health Workers and Home Visitors and act on what they say is important.
- Listen to the asks of Black moms and babies and follow through.
- Partner with expert organizations to learn more about these calls to action and elevate their expertise.

I. Social Determinants of Health: 67 out of a possible 94 points

Low = 0 to 31

Medium = 32 to 63

Lisa Clancy had a High level impact when it came to Social Determinants of Health. Lisa worked with the County Executive to sign an Executive Order to raise the minimum wage for County government employees. She has also engaged with advocates and supported reduced or no-fare programs for young people getting to summer jobs. Chairwoman Clancy sponsored and worked diligently to pass the County Affordable Housing Trust Fund. Also a champion of Early Childhood education, Chairwoman Clancy mobilized her caucus on the Council to fight for and win a \$6 million investment of the County's CARES Act money to go towards direct relief for our early childhood providers as they work to get back on their feet from the pandemic. She has worked with WePower and was invited to serve on an advisory committee to advise the development of the early childhood education playbook. II. Racial Equity in Maternal Health & Mortality: 49 out of a possible 59 points



Lisa Clancy had a High level impact when it came to Racial Equity in Maternal Health and Mortality. Lisa has been a champion of St. Louis County's Public Health Department and is responsive to their requests and needs, especially as they prioritize racial equity. As the Council provides oversight of federal CARES Act relief dollars, she has pushed making data-driven decisions to ensure that the money is going to residents that are most impacted by systemic racism and inequality. Chairwoman Clancy led the charge to ensure that period products were available to those in custody at her jail, free of charge. She sits on the Board of Directors for NARAL Pro-Choice Missouri and has taken on consulting work with Generate Health through her role with Gladiator Consulting.
